Trevor Harlow and Trenton Buhr (see Trenton's profile <u>here</u>) selected an economic development project for their Rural Futures Institute (RFI) serviceship and the community was lucky enough to be selected. Both young men have been in town since May 21st assisting with various projects, including the creation of a multiyear Economic Development Plan for the City of Red Cloud. One of the ultimate goals of this plan would be to enable Red Cloud to create and implement an LB840 Municipal Option Economic Development Plan after the passage of funding connected to LB357, which is geared towards repairing infrastructure. Their work will go well beyond creating drafts of the plan, however, as they have already assisted with the Cather Conference, BRAN (Bike Ride Across Nebraska), and the Red Cloud Proud Community Cleanup Program. Through the rest of the summer they will also draft a basic strategic plan for the Starke Round Barn, bolster the work already being done with Heritage Tourism, assist with the Good Living Tour, create a grants/loans database for the City, and develop a draft of a housing plan. We truly wish we could keep them year round!

RFI, one of four interdisciplinary Institutes of the <u>University of Nebraska (NU)</u>, leverages the talents and research-based expertise from across the four NU campuses on behalf of rural communities in Nebraska, the U.S. and around the world. Through a culture of innovation and entrepreneurship, the institute encourages bold and futuristic approaches to address critical rural issues. It works collaboratively with educational,

business, community, non-profit, government and foundation partners to empower rural communities and their leaders. TREVOR HARLOW

Tell us a little bit about yourself

My name is Trevor Harlow, and I'm from a small town just outside of Omaha called Waterloo. I am currently a Senior at the University of Nebraska at Omaha studying Political Science and Environmental Studies. After I graduate this next year I plan on attending graduate school to get a master's in Public Policy with a focus on Environmental Policy. Afterwards I hope to work for the Environmental Protection Agency or a similar department or organization to do policy analyzing and management, or similar type work. I am here in Red Cloud this summer as part of the Rural Futures Institute from the Nebraska University system. This organization pairs students like me with communities around Nebraska to work on specific projects for the community. I couldn't be happier to be here in Red Cloud this summer, and I hope we're able to make a difference for the community in our 10 short weeks here!

Can you talk a little bit about what made you decide to become a Rural Futures Institute intern?

I have lived very close to the biggest urban center in the state (Omaha) and have only really been exposed to that aspect of community, governance, and way of life. I felt that this program would be a great chance to work in a truly rural part of small town Nebraska, and to get a real feel for how that aspect of the country is.

Why did you decide to do an internship in Red Cloud?

I was given a chance to pick the project, and not necessarily the community. I was very interested in Red Cloud's project of economic and community development, and I knew that was the kind of work I wanted to do. I was also very happy to find out Red Cloud was where I would be this summer, I think it is a perfect exposure to a new type of community that is rural and small, but also so alive and active.

Prior to your arrival, did you know anything about Red Cloud?

I had known all about the Willa Cather influence in the community but had never been here before this, so I didn't know much else coming into it.

What is your favorite thing about Red Cloud so far?

The people, and this amazing community they have built. Red Cloud is a lot different than other small towns, they don't just try and be kind and welcoming they are truly trying to build a community with something special that you just don't see everywhere.

Do you have any advice for community leaders to help get young professionals to stay in Red Cloud long term?

I would say that it is important to just market the community in a way that fits their demographic. That age group doesn't look for the same thing that other groups do, so the strategy to sell the community to them is different, and it is all about freedom, opportunity, and ability to live a life they want. I also think it is important to market towards young people that still live in the community, and are out of high school age now. This group is prime young demographic, since they already have a reason to be here. It's important to market secondary education to them, and then Red Cloud second, because you want to have a professional young population. It is all about specific targeted marketing for the group.

If you could have a superpower what would it be and why?

It is a little over the top but messing with gravity would be fun. You realistically could do anything: Want to fly? Lighten gravity. Want to move stuff around with your mind? Mess with its gravity. You can even time travel by really messing with the gravity.

Do you have any hobbies?

I like gardening or amateur landscaping, and in my free time I mostly like to weight lift, play video games, spend time with friends, or be outdoors.

Do you have any pets?

I have a cat named Isaiah, which is named after my great-great-great uncle.

Describe what a perfect weekend would be like for you?

I would say being able to have free time to do what I want and be with my friends. Ideally, going on a weekend trip, something like Kansas City. If I can be with friends, be able to do what I want to do I consider it a great weekend.

What would your high school teachers or guidance counselor say about you if we asked?

They would say I am a goofy kid, but also the most responsible and one of the most dedicated students you'll find. I really set myself apart from a lot of students in high school, because I had clear goals for what I wanted to do, and so I worked hard to prepare myself to get there. I also was inherently very responsible, and a lot of the staff trusted me to make the right call and be respectful.

What are you most proud of?

This past year I got the Waterloo Park and Tree Board reinstated, and so far, we have planted 8 trees, and have done the first part of a complete remodel for a park in the town, based on my landscape design. We added flowers, made new infrastructure in it, and truly transformed it.

Do you have a mantra or mission statement you live by?

Not anything really specific, but I always try to remember that it doesn't matter where you come from, or where you are now, or even where you are going. Everyone can and will make an impact, and it is just up to us to decide how positive of an impact we can make. The potential is in us all though.

What historical figure or celebrity would you most like to spend a week with? Why?

Jimmy Carter. I honestly think that a lot of his policies and way of thinking while in office was relatively good. He may have not executed it perfectly, and may have not done everything right, but ethically and morally I think he was the best we've had. It would be great spending time helping him volunteer, seeing the difference he can still make while 91, and being able to talk with him about the current politic climate, I am sure he would have a lot to say.
